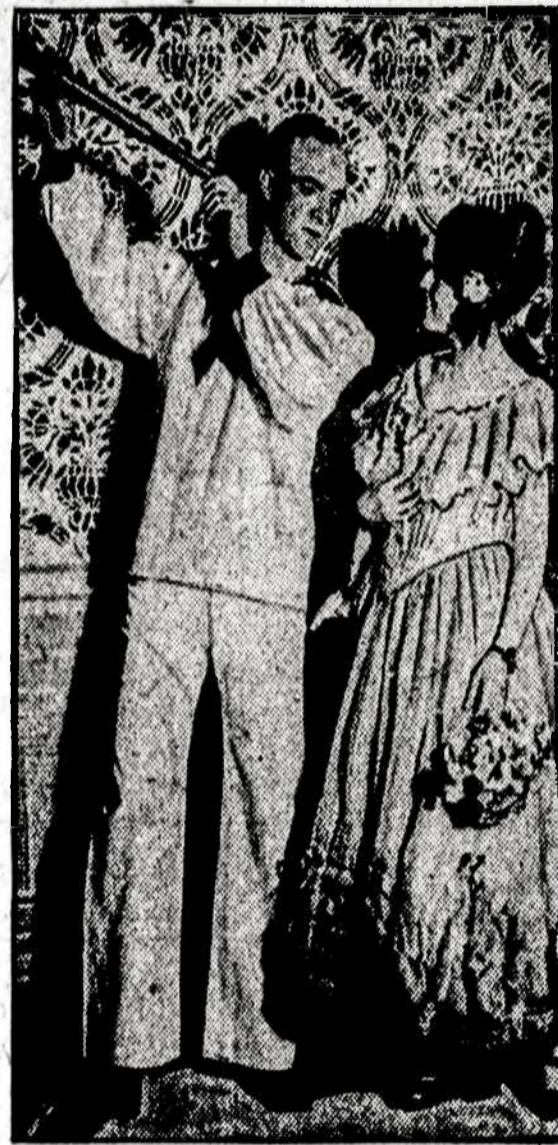

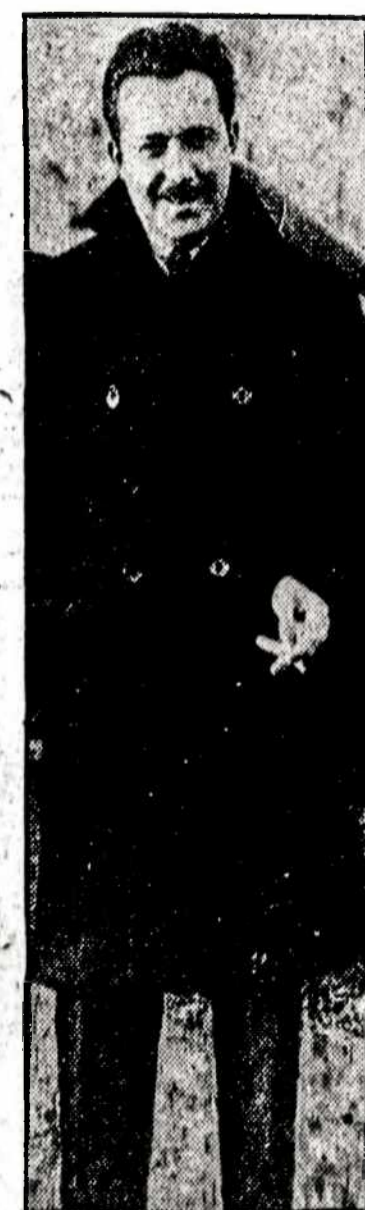

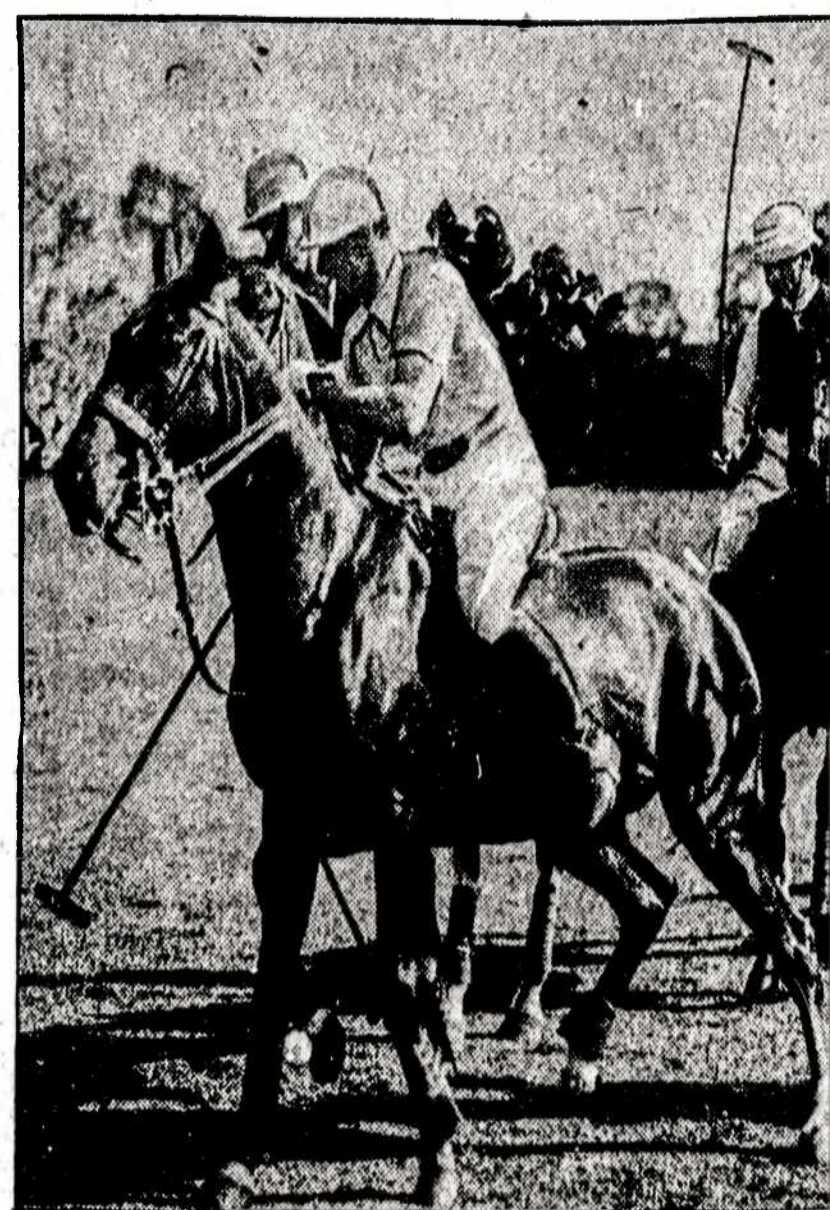
SEMAPHORE SENTINELS
